Synchronicity? Synchrodestiny? Call it what you will. When "coincidence" happens, you can pay attention to it or dismiss it.

I've watched What the Bleep Do We Know and Mind Walk. I've read mind-body books by Deepak Chopra and Wayne Dyer and Joe Dispenza. I imagined my book as a dark comedy travel guide of sorts (like Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy), taking a civilian like myself into the world of the military and into the world of undeclared war. (To be honest, I saw my book turning into a film starring Tina Fey. But timing is everything, and Tina's already done her Afghanistan movie. I'm on the lookout for a strong, funny, small-framed, energetic female for the role. Please send me your recommendations!;)

Peg, a retired Navy nurse who spent her career as a woman in the military, got excited about my book idea and insisted that I meet her next door neighbor Ann. Coincidentally, Elizabeth Ann Tyndall, PhD was a writer who self-published <u>eBooks on Amazon</u>. Ann might have some ideas for me!

Our initial get-together at Ann's house on 11 March was an incredible convergence of strong-woman² energy. We spent two hours visiting (which is a very southern way to spend time), and talking about writing, publishing, and my book ideas. Friends, family, and stateside coworkers were my lifeline to home; they gave perspective to my work and life in Afghanistan. Many of those listed sent me emails, texts, and letters from which I extracted passages that help bring this tale to life.

My AFPAK Hand colleagues deployed to Afghanistan with me but were based in Kabul and elsewhere. Without their support, insight, and advice, I would have never gotten outside the wire. My battle buddies (U.S. Marines, British military, and DOS-USAID civilians) share a bond with me that will never be broken. We depended on each other as we sorted through the mess that was Afghanistan on our watch. (This is NOT an inclusive list of everyone with whom I served. The military and civilians in Cast of Characters is related to those who play a prominent role in my story.

INTRODUCTION

A Reader's Guide

When I enter a museum exhibit, I scan the room and then head to the display that for some reasons attracts me the most. I don't follow directional arrows placed on the walls or guidelines published in a printed handout or the numbered stops in order as determined by an audio guide.

This eBook series is yours to explore in the order you wish.

If you want to get into the thick of the war and begin with the serious challenges and consequences of stability op missions in a counterinsurgency battle space, begin by reading the **Prelude**, dedicated to MSgt Scott Pruitt.

If, however, you want the story to unfold in a somewhat "cause- effect" chronology, then begin with **Book One: The Back Story**--"How I Got to Now."

Book Two: Getting There is a two part volume that begins with the *S.A.P. Training Essays*. These will be of interest if you want to know more of what it took to get deployed--such as the fun times with medical exams and training at Camp Atterbury, Indiana. (While I was in Afghanistan, I sent several of these essays to the New Yorker. Still waiting for a reply...) *Part Two-Into Theater* starts after Deployment countdown begins in earnest as I prepare for and then board my flight into theater. But it is only after three weeks in Kabul area that I finally arrive in the Dasht-e Margo (Desert of Death), Helmand Province, RCSW Camp Leatherneck. Join me in this story as I tiptoe into the world of CENTCOM

Book Three: Being There is also a two part volume. *Part One - Being There* delves into life in Afghanistan, in the desert, at the Camp Leatherneck--a Super FOB, and in my CAN--my home away from home. *Part Two - Working There* brings you into the situation of working in Afghanistan, in Operation Enduring Freedom, at RCSW in Stability Ops. It also takes you into the field exploring water issues from Kajaki Reservoir to Lashkar Gah to the hamouns on the Afghanistan border with Iran. (Examination of the water-food-energy nexus or the mission critical nature of water in the context of national security are beyond the scope of this work. However, as part of the eBook, you'll be given hyperlinks to my dissertation on COIN and Water Resource Management and to a number of published articles on the water situation in southwestern Afghanistan.)

Book Four: Reintegration presents the disorienting experience of returning home, whether for leave or home for good. What happens when you're *home on leave* from a combat zone? It was clear that just about no one in the States remembered that US forces were still fighting in Afghanistan, a.k.a. "the long war." The minimal news coverage and lack of public interest or outcry made things awkward. What happens when you *redeploy (return home for good)*? What do you say when people want to know about your work or what it's like over there? What do

you say when people ask, "How are you?" covers six months, from my return to northern Virginia--in time for MSgt Pruitt's funeral at Arlington Cemetery--to finding a place for myself as a senior research geographer with an unquenchable thirst to continue work on water's relationship to security and stability.

Book Five: Separation. How is life after my stint with DOD? Are Lessons Learned in Afghanistan transferable? This eBook provides an executive summary of seven years of water research, and lays out the importance of a water-food-energy systems approach to understanding stability-- in Afghanistan or elsewhere. It also presents my insight into the good, bad, and ugly aspects of serving in a "one off" civilian surge assignments. Finally, I give you my personal and professional BLUF.

Take-Aways

- Bypassing the clearly defined, channeled career streams of fluvial geomorphology and hydrogeology, I followed a meandering course through anthropology, cultural geography, wetlands ecology, hydrology, geomorphology, and water resource management and emerged as a something new—a hydrogeographer. As such, I went forth to the desert of southwestern Afghanistan to be in the field, to learn all I could first-hand, and to share in discussion and dialogue about the Helmand River watershed. The Helmand's water sustains life. It is tied to Afghanistan's food and energy production. To achieve stability in the region, it is imperative to factor water into the equation, to put it in the context of national security.
- I have always been a woman of many "covers" (military speak for "hats"); this quite possibly was particularly useful during my deployment in Afghanistan, when being flexible and recognizing the role(s) to play and the hat (or scarf) to grab were critical to my success.
- I am an educator and owe my ability to "brief"—I can captivate an audience, that typically has no prior knowledge of the complex issue being addressed, in 10 minutes or less using the expected PowerPoint quad chart with no more than three bullets of non-technical language—to the hundreds of students who have helped me perfect my lecture style.
- I bring a first-hand account of Afghanistan 2011-2012. From the perspective of a civilian who has NEVER served in the uniformed services, I share my shock and awe as I find and fumble my way through the military world of acronyms, numbers, and rank. From a geographer's perspective, I highlight the landscape's human dimensions, physical features, and human-environment interaction. From the perspective of a western woman, wife, and mother, I provide observations of and interactions with Afghans and my military and civilian associates.
